- **Groups of interests:** By presenting alternative priorities, values and ideologies of the policy, bill and budgeting process, it presents a viable alternative to the present government and protects the interests of minorities.
- **Electoral Transparency:** The Opposition works with mass media and civil society organisations to improve and monitor the quality of voter registration and ensure fair voting.
- **Appointments:** The Leader of the Opposition plays an important role in the appointment to important posts like CVC and Lokpal.

Shadow Cabinet (Shadow Cabinet)
