- A. Section 66E: Punishment for violation of privacy
- B. Section 67: Publishing or transmitting obscene material
- C. Section 67A: Publishing sexually explicit material
- D. Section 67B: Child-related sexual content
- E. Section 72: Breach of confidentiality and privacy

These provisions are particularly relevant in cases involving women's digital exploitation.

The National Cyber Crime Reporting Portal and women-focused helplines have made it easier for victims to report offences and seek assistance. Alongside government efforts, non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and women support groups play an important role in providing legal guidance, counseling, and emotional support to victims of cyber abuse. These organizations also conduct awareness programs and workshops to educate women about online safety and legal rights. Furthermore, technology companies such as Google, Meta, and Microsoft have a significant responsibility in preventing online abuse. By strengthening privacy policies, improving content moderation, detecting fake accounts, and using artificial intelligence for identifying harmful content, these companies contribute to reducing cyber threats against women.

Challenges and Future Perspectives

Despite the progress made in cyber laws and digital awareness, several challenges continue to hinder effective prevention of cyber-crimes against women. One of the major challenges is the emergence of AI-driven crimes, including deepfake technology, voice cloning, and advanced digital manipulation.
